Donat Cross

As part of the rejuvenation of the Order in Canada, Council has agreed to award the Donat Cross to those making significant financial gifts to the work of the Order. This medal, long a fixture in other jurisdictions, is the only medal given solely on the basis of financial contribution. To be eligible the potential recipient must be prepared to make a gift of a minimum of Five Thousand US Dollars or more and declare their intent to do so before making the gift. There are several classes of the Cross and the award is made at the Chapter General following the completion of payment. One of the trips many of our members make over the course of their lifetime is a pilgrimage to the Holy Land. Those that do, and who can provide documentation indicating visits to specific venues are eligible to apply for a Pilgrims Shell. The application is made to the Keeper of the Crusader's Medal Lynn Dalton Lathrop, CLJ a member of the Grand Priory of America and requires the Grand Priors signature verifying that the member is in good standing. ANDY'S HOUSE, MUSKOKA, ONTARIO

The Mission of Hospice Muskoka is to be there with individuals and families wherever compassionate end of life and bereavement care is needed, in partnership with an engaged community.

On June 20 2005, Constable Andrew Potts and partner Matt Hanes of the OPP were involved in a car accident while on duty. Tragically, Andy was killed and Matt was seriously injured. In 2006, The Andy Potts Memorial Foundation was created to raise money for community projects in Andy's name. Since 2012, the Foundation has been working tirelessly to achieve a campaign goal of 2.5 million to build Andy's House, an integrated Hospice Palliative Care Hub.

Hospice Muskoka has been working on the development of a Hospice Residence since 2001. Thanks to the hard work of the Andy Potts Memorial Foundation and the generous support of many different individuals, groups, businesses and the community, 80% of the \$2.5 million dollar capital campaign has been realized. The Fund Raising Committee for the Hospice is Bob Potts, Matt Hanes, John Panikkar OLJ and Ross McLean KCLJ. Construction has begun with the goal of enclosing the building by Christmas to complete interior work over the winter and to open in early summer of 2019. The Andy Potts Memorial Foundation plans to gift the building to Hospice Muskoka when completed.

facility will be situated on a 13.4 acre parcel of land in Port Carling donated by local resident Brock Napier to the Township of Muskoka Lakes.

As Hospice Muskoka serves all of South and West Muskoka, it is an ideal location, overlooking the Indian River and no more than 25 minutes from most communities in South and West Muskoka or 20 minutes' drive from the hospital in Bracebridge.

The facility is being built as a series of pods, to best suit the site where it will be located. Each pod can be dedicated to its own functionality. Hospice Muskoka is planning to move its current operation – Visiting Hospice Volunteer, Grief and Bereavement, Caregiver support and Hospice Palliative Care Education programs to Andy's House when it opens. Among the Board members of Hospice Muskoka are Mary Grady CLJ, Chair and Lucy McLean MLJ.

ATALANTA HOSPICE

Last autumn, the Order was the inspiration to establish a hospice project in the south-west corner of Nova Scotia. along the Bay of Fundy coast. The project began in September 2017 with the registration of a non-profit entity named the Atalanta Hospice Society. All of the founding members of its Board of Directors are members of the Acadia Commandery and the House of Fundy.

Work on refining the project, the objectives and clarifying exactly what can be done locally occurred over the past

year. With the assistance of the Grand Priory in Canada and the Rejuvenation Fund, the **Atalanta Hospice Society** organized an information event this past September in Smiths Cove at the Villages of Mountain Gap (a resort in the Cove) where 30 people attended. This sharing of information with the locals was enhanced with the presence of Ross McLean who shared valuable input and experience with the Muskoka Hospice. The presentation was considered a success, and much discussion and questions regarding the hospice project continue today. The event eventually found its way into the province's newspaper, The Chronicle Herald, as well as the local regional paper, the Tri-County Vanguard out of Yarmouth. The

Atalanta group are planning a similar event in the Annapolis Royal area in November.

It is clear that such offering of expertise by the Order is an invaluable resource, in particular, for those more remote and rural areas of Canada. These areas typically have low-density population and are often overlooked with respect to implementations of health care services as these are frequenty focused in city centres in Nova Scotia.

The Atalanta Hospice Society wish to thank the Order of Saint Lazarus for their support in this initiative, and look forward to working further with the Order, hopefully, expediting this project to come to fruition sooner than later.

FRIENDS OF THE ORDER DAVID CVET

The Friend of the Order is a concept hatched during the strategic workshop hosted by the Toronto Commandery at Deerhurst in 2017. The various challenges posed to a number of workgroups cultivated a dynamic and energetic dialogue between members of the Order. The genesis of the idea was put forward by Dr. Ken Buchholz, OLJ and David M. Cvet, CLJ. The Acadia Commandery took this idea back to the Maritimes and developed a full-fledged Friend of the Order program, which at the time of this writing, has seven Friends.

The idea behind the program is to create a new mechanism to attract greater numbers of individuals connected and

engaged with the Order by localizing the objectives to the local community of a House within the Commandery. The pilot was conducted within the House of Fundy, Acadia Commandery which spans the municipalities of Digby and Annapolis, both which are adjacent to the Bay of Fundy. The program provides a low-cost commitment to the Order and allows one to learn more about the Order from the "inside" with the possibility to expand their association in becoming a full member of the Order in the future.

Roberta "Bert" Heembrock, a Friend of the Order stated, "The Friends program provides an opportunity to become a good citizen of the community by helping out in this way and the program offers a way to learn more about the Order". Members of the House of Fundy initiated a project in 2017 to pursue the establishment of a residential-style hospice in the area through the not-for-profit **Atalanta Hospice Society** (the HMS Atalanta is the name of a 14-gun ship captained by Rear Admiral Robert Digby

who conveyed Loyalists from New York City in 1783 to Conway, later renamed to Digby).



BRIAN T. NEWBOLD, HISTORIAN OF SAINT LAZARUS CANADA, RECEIVES AWARD

Chev. Professor emeritus Brian T. Newbold, GCLJ,GOMLJ, Historian of the Grand Priory of the Order of Saint Lazarus in Canada, has been named Laureate of the 2018 Award for Distinguished Contribution to the Society of Computer Chemistry of Japan. This National honour was given in recognition of Professor Newbold's more than fifteen years of excellent service as a corrector of research papers submitted to two Japanese Journals; as well as his contributions as a member of two Editorial Boards. The Award presentation took place at the National Institute of Technology in Tokyo, on June 7, 2018.




ACCESS
