I'm hopeful it was grief talking but I suspect that the clinical side 'forgot' the caregiver and the journey to get to the end stages. Our support of those caregivers through the Home Caregivers Support Programme and A Caregivers Guide has never been more important. That work does make a positive difference and it matters

As we move through a world of war and additional waves of Covid, we need to be mindful that small acts of kindness, love for one another, no matter the religious bent, and care for the caregiver will mark us out as faith soldiers and servants.

WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY (WCPU) — Courtesy of Amelia Pahl



The (WPCU) is an annual ecumenical celebration, traditionally held between January 18 and 25 in the Northern Hemisphere. During this period, Christians worldwide are invited to pray for the unity of all Christians, to reflect on scripture together, and to participate in jointly-organized ecumenical events using materials produced by a different international community each year.

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity was first proposed in 1908 as an observance within the Roman Catholic Church by Fr Paul Wattson, founder of the Franciscan Friars of the Atonement in Graymoor, New York. Since the founding of the World Council of Churches (WCC) in 1948, many other Christian denominations around the world have come to celebrate the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, and

since 1968, the Faith and Order Commission of the WCC and the Pontifical Council for Promoting Christian Unity have collaborated to produce materials for use over this eight-day period.

In Canada, in partnership with the Prairie Centre for Ecumenism and the Canadian Centre for Ecumenism, The Canadian Council of Churches oversees a small team of volunteers who prepare Canada-specific to complement each year's international materials.

Support from Saint Lazarus Canada expands WPCU horizons in Canada In September 2020, thanks to the generous support of Saint Lazarus Canada, The Canadian Council of Churches was able to expand its WPCU-related work by hiring Amelia Pahl to the position of Program Assistant for the WCPU. Amelia is a student at the Canadian Mennonite University in Winnipeg, MB, and plans to pursue M.Div. studies through the Montréal School of Theology in the coming years. In addition to

supporting the Canadian WPCU website and newsletter, Amelia works to connect directly with local organizers, listening to their stories and raising awareness of the diverse expressions of the WPCU in Canada.



Based in Subdury, ON, an evening WPCU service was sponsored by the Saint Lazarus Canada. Pastor Eric Dyck of St. John's Lutheran Church in Montréal offered the sermon.

These conversations have revealed a wealth of

ecumenical wisdom, experience, and creativity in communities throughout Canada, and they have also enabled a clearer understanding of the kinds of cross-Canada support that communities need for their local ecumenical efforts to flourish. One local leader based in Fort Qu'Appelle, SK, believes that a practice like the WPCU enables people to tap into a natural "instinct" for ecumenism: "My sense is that, as limited as these ecumenical initiatives are, they strike something in people's hearts that gives them a freedom to relate, and another way to meet people they may have known for a long time, but can now meet in another way, in a safe place. It gives them permission to follow what I think is their instinct."

Unsurprisingly, the WCPU is in a time of transition as communities across Canada await a new "normal" after years of pandemic. However, this has not stopped many communities from finding creative ways to engage the WPCU, such as the online service in January 2022 sponsored by the Saint Lazarus Canada and based in Sudbury, ON. As the WPCU continues to change, we look forward to seeing what new kinds of cross-Canada ecumenical connections will become possible in the coming years.

The award was presented at the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity Ecumenical Worship Service on January 23, 2022, at Our Lady of Good Help Maronite Catholic Church.

Rev. Marilyn McClung Memorial Award

The Rev. Marilyn McClung Memorial Award came into being to honour the life of Rev. Marilyn McClung, who passed away on February 7th, 2001. Marilyn had served as EDCC representative for the Anglican Diocese of Edmonton under the leadership of Bishops Ken Genge and Victoria Matthews. Marilyn served on the executive of the EDCC as Secretary and Vice President; tragically, however, because of health concerns, she was unable to take on the role of President. In her ecumenical endeavours, Marilyn served on several

committees helping to organize dialogue days, prayer services and was a key leader behind the Jubilee 2000 "J2K

Festival" in Edmonton. Marilyn also devoted her energies to continuing ecumenical education for herself and others.

The Rev. Marilyn McClung Memorial Award is given to a member of the community who has made outstanding or specific contributions to the ecumenical landscape of Edmonton and/ or its surrounding districts. Recipients are individuals who, whether or not they were ever affiliated with the Council, nevertheless could be considered ambassadors of the EDCC in the community.

Thank you for your kind and heartfelt gift of **\$10,000.00**, received on **February 4, 2022**, in support of **The Ottawa Mission's Diane Morrison Hospice**. The Hospice is a very special place where homeless men and women receive 24-hour palliative nursing care, and vital emotional and spiritual support, in the final days of their lives – people like Raymond.

Raymond is a gentle and friendly 63-year-old man from a small farming community in Manitoba where he lived until he was almost 30. "We took care of the land, the garden and the chickens," he remembers fondly.

When he was seven, his mother moved in with his new stepfather, a decision he calls a "mistake". His stepfather had a problem with alcohol, and his mother, who didn't drink, began to drink too. Alcohol fueled fighting between the two of them, and also the beatings from his stepfather.

After he left the farm, Raymond moved across Canada in search of new jobs, new homes and a new life, and his own problem with alcohol ebbed and flowed. As he grew older he developed heart problems as well as anxiety and panic attacks. As his health declined further, he became unable to look after himself and moved into our Hospice – the oldest and largest within a homeless shelter in North America – in August 2020.

Now Raymond finds comfort and caring in the relationships he's developed with Hospice staff. "It's so quiet and peaceful here. There's no pressure." He has his own room and is provided 24-hour support.

Your kindness and caring have finally given Raymond the home he needs and deserves. On behalf of Raymond, thank you so much for your support and compassion. We are very grateful for your generosity.

Home Caregiver Support Program in Kitchener-Waterloo

Caring for a loved one with a chronic condition or life-limiting illness can be a rewarding experience and, at the same time can be stressful and full of unknowns as well. Caregivers are faced with many tasks on a day-to-day basis, while taking care of their loved one at home.

Home caregivers are ordinary people, who offer physical and emotional support to a family, partner, friend, or neighbor, often without pay. There are approximately 3.3 **FIRST**_{in}

million caregivers in Ontario alone.

The Home Caregiver Support Program aims to provide much SAVING LIVES needed support and education.

The program is based on A Caregivers Guide, A Handbook about End-of-Life Care, published by Saint

Lazarus Canada and the Canadian Hospice Palliative Care Organization. The program consists of 4 modules that deal with aspects that Home Caregivers are confronted with. Topics by our Highly Qualified and Trained Facilitators are, among many, How to Provide Personal Care; What is Advanced Care Planning; Coping with Caregiver's Stress and Burnout; Where Can I Find Help; and, How to Deal with Grief and End-of-Life.
