COMMANDERIES' ROUNDUP – 2021

COVID-19 has changed many things in our lives but despite the changes the work of Saint Lazarus Canada continues. Following are some examples of what has happened in the Commanderies across Canada.

Here are some of the highlights for 2021.

ACADIA COMMANDERY Commander – Chevalier David Cvet



Acadia has successfully installed, at the *Tideview LTC Centre*, two tablets fitted to goosenecked floor stands that enable palliative patients to virtually connect with loved ones, without the constant aid of a caregiver.

ARCTIC COMMANDERY Commander – Chevalier Michael Kalnay



Working with the *Yellowknife Health and Social Services* the Arctic Commandery has fulfilled their plan to have copies of the *Caregiver's Guide* available to thirty (30) nursing stations

"North of 60" and they actively promote the on-line Caregiver's program. In an area of the country where hospital and hospice care are not readily available the Caregiver's Guide is a valuable tool for those who must care for their loved ones at home. Members in Yellowknife were able to safely gather for an outdoor visit – even the rain didn't deter them.

COMMANDERS' CORNER



Professor Emerita Diana Pallen DLJ, OMLJ, Commander of the Thunder Bay Commandery graciously consented to be my third Commander to interview.

Thunder Bay, in the "Land of the Sleeping Giant", has been Diana's home since the tender age of seven months, when Thunder Bay was still known as Port Arthur and Fort William. A temporary move by her parents to help her maternal Grandmother morphed into a permanent residency for her family and as Diana proudly states, "I remain in the same neighbourhood I have been in my entire life".

Diana earned her nursing diploma from St. Joseph's School of Nursing, Port Arthur and began her career with fourteen years of bedside nursing, some of which included just over a year in Manchester, England. Back in Canada she returned to "St. Joe's" and embarked on obtaining her BSc Nursing degree. In 1983 Diana transitioned from bedside nursing to teaching and for the next thirty-two years taught at the Lakehead University School of Nursing. During that time, she completed her Master of Nursing Degree (University of Manitoba) and furthering her quest for knowledge an Honours BA(English).

Fiercely proud of her Finnish roots, she's fluent in Finnish. Diana serves on the Suomi Foundation Board (member and representative on the Advisory Committee for the Chair in Finnish Studies) and is Matron of the Ladies of Kaleva, an organization founded over one hundred years ago that focuses on Finnish culture.

Well-travelled, having been bitten by the "travel bug" during her time in England, Diana has visited many places and looks forward to when she can safely travel again – hopefully she will be able to add to her 18+ visits to Finland and her relatives there on both sides of her family.

Meanwhile, she continues to give back to her community, sitting on the local Museum Board, (serving as their representative to Thunder Bay's Heritage Advisory Committee), and as secretary of the Northwestern Ontario Pastoral Institute.

In 2004, while bringing greetings, on behalf of Lakehead University, to a local palliative care organization, Diana was approached by *Dame Margaret Page* and, after learning about the *Order of Saint Lazarus*, accepted the invitation to join. Since being invested in 2005 at the Winnipeg Chapter General, Diana has been a tireless advocate and worker for Saint Lazarus Canada and was promoted to Dame in 2012 at the Toronto Chapter General. She follows Chevalier Edward Meijer as Commander of the Thunder Bay Commandery.

A caring, compassionate, hardworking member of the Order it can truly be said of Diana, as was whispered in my ear after being dubbed, *"There's nothing like a Dame"*.
